

KEY TOPICS

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Vale Robin Adams

Council paid tribute to former Mayor and community leader, Robin Adams, at its September meeting, acknowledging a life of impressive achievements and accomplishments.

Lead Administrator, Scott Mason noted that Ms Adams many achievements and tireless advocacy for Norfolk Island weren't all related to her professional life but spanned many community groups and activities.

Members of the public gallery, which included Robin's family and friends, were invited to join the Administrators and staff for a short break in which to reflect on a life well-lived, one dedicated to her community.

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ROADWORKS

Whilst there are still a large number to go, the roads team has been making good progress through the backlog of potholes that had built up through the wetter months.

There have been some intermittent mechanical issues with the Jetmaster patching truck along the way, which has slowed progress briefly, but we are seeing a general reduction in potholes across the island.

The second half of Colins Head Road, see image at right, between the school and Stockyard Road has now received a tar seal. This treatment to the surface will see that most moisture will run off the road, rather than soaking into the road and opening up new potholes.

New flashing beacons have been installed on a number of the Roads trucks to improve the visibility and awareness of the Road team's presence around the island. Please drive safely past these vehicles as crews may be operating in proximity to traffic.

PROJECTS

New metal (gravel) bays are currently being constructed to provide storage for washed gravel ready for use in road reconstruction works. The new storage bays are temporary, as the site has an approved DA for building a reuse centre on it.

The Annual Road Renewal Program projects to replace several sections of roads is scheduled to recommence mid-late October, once backlog of pothole patching has been reduced to a manageable level to free up resources to allow both road projects and road maintenance to occur in parallel.



The schedule for road reconstruction is intended to be in the following order:

- Calebs Lane (recommence);
- Bumbora Road, for 100m from the Bumbora Reserve cattle grid;
- Anson Bay Road, between Headstone Road and Mission Road.

Radio and newspaper updates will occur in advance of planned works and provide information regarding any potential road closures.

Recruitment of NIRC General Manager underway

Norfolk Island Regional Council has appointed Local Government Management Services (LGMS) to undertake full recruitment activities for the role of General Manager.

LGMS was selected from three recruitment agencies who responded to the request to quote for the recruitment activity.

The agency will be responsible for all advertising, police checks and further background checks, and will provide Council with a shortlist of candidates to be considered by a selection advisory panel, which will be comprised of both NIRC Administrators and members of the community.

Advisory Committee Recommendations Endorsed by Council

The second meeting of the Environment and Sustainability Advisory Committee (ESAC), held on 9 September 2025, resulted in recommendations to Council in three key areas.

Following discussions about the prioritisation process for the island's waterways and wetlands for environmental protection, the advisory group sought a draft priority list to be presented to a future committee meeting for review. This review would ensure that the development of the draft Norfolk Island Waterway and Wetland Management Strategy 2025-2035 reflected areas of high community value.

The committee also considered the Draft Drought Management Plan, an important document that includes strategies for water conservation, contingency measures and community engagement during periods of drought on the island, recommending that community education on groundwater/bores and the desalination plant would be included.

Following review, each of the draft documents will be placed on public exhibition for 28 days to allow community feedback to be collected and considered.

A further recommendation was put forward for Council to source data from Regional Development Australia (RDA) on socio-economic and environmental effects of cruise ship visits.

All of the advisory committee recommendations were endorsed by Council, with Lead Administrator, Scott Mason, commenting on the excellent work being done by the group.

Norfolk Island Plan 2002 - Draft Housekeeping Amendments 2025

The Norfolk Island Plan 2002 (the NI Plan), the statutory land use plan for Norfolk Island has been in effect since 2004.

A number of variations to the NI Plan have been made since that time, most recently in March 2023. Since then, a number of necessary corrections and amendments have been identified that would help interpretation and improve efficiencies in application of the Plan.

What do you know about Planning Certificates?

Are you looking at buying a property on Norfolk Island? Or interested in details about your own block of land?

Anyone can apply for information about a specific portion of land in Norfolk Island by applying for a Planning Certificate.

These Certificates are common in most jurisdictions and are used most often when purchasing land to find out information about the block of land and any buildings at the land, such as:

- compliance with requirements of the Planning and Building legislation;
- whether the land can be subdivided;
- what the land could be developed for under the current planning controls;
- whether the land is subject to heritage management;
- whether there might be a registered bore on the land.
- whether the land is in an Argentine Ant Management Zone.

The Application Form is available from Council's website at <u>application-for-planning-certificate.pdf</u>.

The current fee is \$181.13.

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Tertiary Education & Community Strategic Plan Grants Awarded

Norfolk Island Regional Council announced the successful applicants for two grant programs at its 24 September meeting.

Ten applications for support through the Norfolk Island Regional Council 2025 Tertiary Education Grant program have been successful, with a total of \$11,000 awarded to Norfolk Islanders pursuing further education.

NIRC has not offered this grant program since 2023, which was established to assist with the cost of travel to Australia and/or study-related studies for students enrolled in accredited tertiary and vocational courses.

Financial Administrator, Gary Mottau, said, "It's pleasing to note that the current budget has provision for a total of \$72,000 for all of Council's community grant programs, which includes the Tertiary Education Grants."

"On behalf of the Lead Administrator and myself, I offer my congratulations to successful applicants," Mr Mottau said.

Grants of \$1,100 each have been awarded to: Ella Borg; Ashleigh Christian; Cameron Christian; Maycee Deszecsar; T'Sharn Evans; Flynn McCowan; Ashley Porter; Mitchell Randall; Natalie Williams; and Stephanie Williams.

The study areas that the grant recipients will use their grants for include tertiary courses in pharmacy, carpentry, business, visual communications and design, both primary and secondary education, occupational therapy, behavioural science and mechanical technology.

For the first time since 2023, Council has awarded funding through the Norfolk Island Regional Council Community Strategic Plan Grant Program.

The aims and objectives of this grant program are to support initiatives that directly benefit the community by meeting one of the six key strategic directions contained in the plan.

Projects must be based on Norfolk Island and must provide genuine benefit to the local community, environment or economy. A co-contribution is to be provided from non-Council sources (cash or inkind) to the equivalent of 25% of the total project budget.

A total of \$35,163 funding under Council's Community Strategic Plan 2025 Grant funding program was allocated to the following successful applicants:

- Sarah Robinson \$2,208 for Childbirth Education Program
- Orf Side Cow Hide Producers \$3,500 for purchase of specialised equipment
- Cultural Development Association of Norfolk Island (CDANI) - \$5,000 for purchase of a projector to allow outdoor cinema during summer months
- Cheryl Tennis Club \$4,455 for Pickleball equipment
- Khan Christian and Mandy Gardner \$5,000 for creation of a bee sanctuary, native habitat corridor and coastal restoration
- Norfolk Island Sustainability Hub Inc. \$5,000 for a feasibility study for a community-owned food processing facility
- Fenua & Moana Pty Ltd \$5,000 for support for the Pier to Pine Ocean Swim Festival
- Porpieh Jam \$5,000 for purchase of sound equipment

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Think Before You Pour

NO FOGS DOWN THE SINK

FOGS = FATS. OILS AND GREASES

FOGS used in cooking may be liquid after use but can cool and harden as they travel along pipework.



- Wipe and scrape plates before washing
- Collect used cooking oil into a suitable container, allow it to cool and dispose of it at the waste management centre Use strainers in kitchen sink
- plug holes

- Y Put fats, oils or grease down the sink
- Put food scrapings down the sink
- Pour harmful chemicals down the sink or drain to try to dissolve fats, oils or grease

Collect, cool and throw away - NOT down the toilet

Be kind to our environment





NO FOGS DOWN THE SINK

What actually happens when fats, oil and grease (collectively known as FOGS) from dishes and pans are washed down the sink?

FATBERGS! While this sounds funny, it becomes a problem when blockages and overflows occur from the build-up of FOGS in our wastewater systems

NIRC staff recently removed a 30kg "fatberg" (see image in bottom left of this page) after it caused problems in the system. In that recent blockage, over 120kg of "fatbergs" were recovered from the wastewater system!

This can be avoided by making changes in how we clean up after mealtime.

Businesses and residents can help reduce the number of blockages occurring by adding small amounts of cooled cooking fat to their compost, which we can process in the HotRot.

Larger quantities can be collected in drums and placed in the designated area at the Waste Management Centre and can then be processed through the HotRot where suitable.

Businesses and restaurants could consider installing grease traps to help reduce blockages and overflows and households can make a big difference by scraping plates into the compost - not rinsing leftover sauces or oils down the drain.

No FOGS down the sink = NO fatbergs.

Flora Force Plant Sales Now Weekly!

Thanks to continued dedication by the Flora Force volunteer group, Flora Force Native Plant Sales now happen EVERY FRIDAY (weather permitting) from 9am to 12pm.

All plants are \$10 each, with a \$20 discount applied to purchases of 15 or more plants in one sale.

We now accept EFTPOS as well as cash. Don't forget to return the little pots to help Flora Force reduce their costs and help maximise the returns to the community.

NORFOLK NATIVES - BLOODWOOD

Baloghia inophylla

Family: Euphorbiaceae

Status: Native

Description

Growing to approximately 7m tall, the Bloodwood has a typical bushy 'tree' shape. Leaves are 5-11cm long but tend to be larger on young plants. Dark green, slightly glossy and oval shaped with a narrower end at the base, leaves grow in opposite pairs.

Flowers are 7-10mm wide with 5 white petals and pale yellow/green stigma. Seedpods are bumpy. Green when immature and gradually turning brown.

As pods mature and dry, the tri-fold segments rapidly pop open to release 3 oval-shaped brown seeds.

Distribution

More commonly found inland in existing forest, in valleys or along ridgelines. Will readily self-propagate where cows are not present.

Growing conditions

Grows better with partial shade.

Propagation

Very easily propagated at home. Collect seedpods once dry but before pods have cracked open.

Other information

The Bloodwood gets its name from the blood-red sap it produces when cut or wounded.

Traditionally, this sap was harvested for use as ink on Norfolk Island.
